### Library Program Registration

in order to offer the most valuable library program possible, it is sometimes necessary to limit the number of children or adults who may participate in each program's session. This is particularly true in interactive programs in which is large number of participants will diminish the effectiveness for those attending.

For this reason the Children's Department limits the number of children who may enroll in each preschool and coddler story time session, so that each child will have a meaningful experience. In the same way, solds programs, such as Reson. Work story, are limited to the number of persons recommended by the program presentor.

### Library Overdue Fines

The current library overdue fines, including all new materials, have been approved by the Library Board and are as follows:

In addition a 254 per week rental fee is charged for adult records which may be kept for a minimum of seven days.

This includes all adult records, both extertainment and educationall instructional.

Although the 256 fee permits a patron a week's use of the recording, once the due day has passed records are charged 259 per day when overdue.

The rental fees will be used to purchase new records and replace worn ones, facilitating growth and maintenance of the collection.







The new library cards are being issued in anticipation of the library's computerized circulation system, which will be implemented later in 1982. In addition to issuing all new library cards, which will be read by the computer and which will eliminate the need for people to fill out charge slips, the library will also have to place a computerized bar code on each book in the library. Throughout the spring and summer library staff members and volunteers will bar code library materials so that patron cards and library materials can be linked in the computer and will not require paper records of patron transactions. Your patience in assisting us to become automated is greating appreciated by the library stall. 


DUIET IN THE LIBRARY

## Canton Library Keys Into Special Services



he Canton Public Library is located at 1150 S. Canton Center Rd. on the third floor of the Township Administration Building.

The library is open to all Canton residents six days a week. Library hours are Monday through Thursday 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. Friday and Saturday 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. The library's telephone number is 397,0099.

The Library offers a full range of library services including an extensive book collection (almost 60,000 volumes), a wide ringe of programs for children and adults, and complete reference services. Librarians, on dury during all library hours, are available to answer reference questions in person and also provide answers to simple queries via the telephone.

In addition to the large book collection covering a wide variety of topics, the collection includes over 1,000 records containing all kinds of music as well as specialized sound effects, language, instructional, drama and children's records.

The children's department contains filmsteips, cassettes, kits, puppets and educational toys. All of these materials may be borrowed from the library.

Children's library programs range from Toddler and Preschool Storytimes for Children aged 2-5, to programs for school-aged children and young adults. These story, film, pupper show and craft sessions are designed to further interests in books, learning and reading.

Each summer, a popular Summer, Reading Club is held for schoolaged children. They join the club and agree to read throughout besummer. The club meets several times for special programs planned to entertain and encourage reading. A final Party is open to all who have reached their gools.

A young adult program is held cach summer in which those patrons are matched by a computer with books suitable to their interexts. Programs of interest to young adults are held in conjunction with this program throughout the summer.

In addition to the popular summer programs, the library sponsors programs throughout the year to celebrate special events including holidays. National Library Week, and Children's Book Week.

Adults' programming includes

films, lectures, book discussions and demonstrations. Topics have included wills and trusts, resume writing, holiday crafts and customs, financial planning, and library business resources.

To inform Canton residents of current happenings at the library, a diver listing upcoming programs and new services is sent to each Canton bousehold several time a year. In addition, a monthly newsletter, the PATRONS PAGE, is available in the library and programs are advertised in the newspapers and on the library and programs station.


In order to borrow library matenials, patrows must present their nils, patrows must present their library cards. The library requires identification with applicant's conrent address in order to issue a library card. Patrons under eighteen years must have a parent's or guardiant's signature in order to receive a library card. Period of address is also required. Library cards are suited during regular library hours.

The Canton Public Library Board meets in the library on the third Wednesday of each month at 7-30 p.m. The public is invited to attend these open meetings or to direct comments to the Library Director.






