As part of the Metro Net Online Lending Library, patrons can now select from hundreds of popular fiction and nonfiction titles to download to PCs and PDA devices. This makes our eBook program the first completely "virtual" service the library has ever offered, highlighting our commitment to serving patrons online as well as on-site. And since eBooks are automatically checked back into the system after three weeks, there's no need to worry about late fees.

All you need is your library card, an Internet

connection and the site's free eBook reader software. With these simple tools, you can download up to 10 eBooks at once from your home, office or school. You can also search our eBooks using the Web Catalog (http://catalog.cantonpl.org).

Some of the most popular eBooks include new adult, teen and children's titles from favorite authors, recently published novels, business and self-help books. Also popular is the selection of travel guides that travelers can take with them on their laptops or PDAs. 



# Celebrate 100 Years of Dr. Seuss!

"The more you read, the more things you will know. The more that you learn, the more places you'll go." - Dr. Seuss

If you can count one fish, two fish, red fish, blue fish and you love green eggs and ham, then join the Canton Public Library as we celebrate the 100th anniversary of Dr. Seuss' birth on March 2 and "Read Across America" with two Seusstacular programs.

Dr. Seuss, whose real name was Theodore Geisel, wrote his first children's book, And to Think That I Saw It on Mulberry Street, in 1937. It received 27 publishers' rejections! He went on to write dozens of beloved tales that have opened a world of imagination and enjoyment for children everywhere. Upon his death in 1991, there were more than 200 million Dr. Seuss books in print, in 15 languages. Children and adults all over the world continue to honor Dr. Seuss' memory by celebrating "Read Across America" day in March. Founded by the National Education Association, this program encourages adults to spend more time reading with children.
